Rev Mr. Young

My Dear Sir,

As I am to pass through Beverley on Monday next, on my way from Scarboro to Hull, I would be glad to stop a couple of hours in your town, and explain to a few ladies a department of the Peace Movement called the "Olive Leaf Mission," a brief description of which is contained in the enclosed papers. Mr Wm Rowndtree [i.e., Rowntree] of Scarboro [Scarborough], has given me your name, and encouraged me to address you on this subject. If you would be so good as to communicate this proposition to some friend who would invite a few ladies to her house at 2 ½ P.M., on Monday, I should be very happy to meet them, and try to interest them in this beautiful and Christian cause. I should expect to reach Beverley at 12, and leave for Hull at 4 P.M.

I should be much obliged to your kindness and courtesy if you would drop me a line directed to care of Wm Rowndtree, Scarboro, where I expect to spend the Sabbath.
