What is your rationale for choosing and committing to a project in this particular issue area? For instance, you might describe prior volunteer work, specific coursework, or personal background that speaks to the skills, leadership experiences, connections, and/or knowledge that have led you to focus on this issue. Or you might choose to narrate an experience in which you created or participated in a project, program, or organization that innovated or created social value. What gap did it fill? What were the goals and outcomes? What role did you play? Why did you get involved? What was most difficult, challenging and/or fulfilling to you? What would you do differently? What did you learn?

There are two pathways through which sophomores may apply to the LOS Program: either with or without a specific project design in mind. We plan to give priority consideration to those applicants who both demonstrate a track record of scholarship and community engagement in a particular area of focus and who outline an innovative, sustainable, and replicable project design. But students without a detailed project outline should absolutely still apply if they can demonstrate a track record of scholarship and community engagement in a particular area of focus, or a commitment to gain knowledge and experience in a particular focus area.

i) Who might you involve in this project (volunteers, participants, community members, etc.)? What sorts of role(s) might they play?

j) What are the key strategies and activities of your project design?

k) What do you hope will change as a result of your project in the short term? Long term?

l) How might you measure your project's outcomes and impact?

m) What kind of timeline might you envision for this project? Might you plan to implement the project during the school year, over summer or winter breaks, take time off from school, or something else?

n) Describe your sustainability plans. How might the project be maintained by the community or by some other entity, replicated, and/or scaled up in the next five years?
