John V. Hinkel, Public Relations Consultant, Washington, D.C. - Proctor Lippincott sends material regarding Russian treaties and argues against the war in Vietnam.

Frederick M. Hinshaw writes to Mrs. Charlotte Hubbard, State Department re unsatisfactory answer to question in foreign policy briefing. EFS comments.

Rabbi Richard C. Hirsch, Washington. Rabbi Leon I. Feuer, President, Central Conference of American Rabbis sends to President Johnson their condemnation of MLF. Should be cautious about any moves to revive German military might. EFS writes that the problem now is to get the non-proliferation treaty signed. Rabbi Hirsch & Leon Feuer and others met for 45 minutes with Under-Secretary George Ball on MLF and German rearmament. EFS sends proposed resolution by Senator Nelson. Rabbi Hirsch to FN - prefers visits to the White House rather than vigil. EFS sends proposed ideas on President's speech at the UN.

Hallock Hoffman - Gifford Phillips, editor of West Coast Frontier Magazine - hopes EFS can meet. Letter to EFS on meeting with Dean Rusk - convinced that Rusk has little influence on policy and far too much determination to rationalize present policy. Suggests academic analysis of State Department White Paper on Vietnam and proportion of military aid to economic aid. Judy Starbuck writes that since 1955 US has given \$2 billion in economic aid including counterinsurgency funds and \$1.5 billion in military aid. In fiscal 1965 military assistance is expected to be \$330 million. Economic aid in 1964 less than \$225 million. Stanley Sheinbaum calls these State Department figures "nonsense." Judy quotes page 756 of the May 17 Department of State Bulletin on Cost of US effort in Vietnam, estimating cost of US forces operating in South Vietnam "on the order of \$800 million a year."
