Helen C. Riebling, Detroit, Michigan sends clipping from the Detroit Free Press quoting Elton Trueblood as saying, "Just to pull out of Vietnam is the most sinful thing I can imagine. People who suggest pulling out just haven't thought it through. It would lead to murder on a greater scale." ERW reply. AFSC published a full page ad in the New York Times, calling for the end of bombing in Vietnam and a phased withdrawal of troops.
