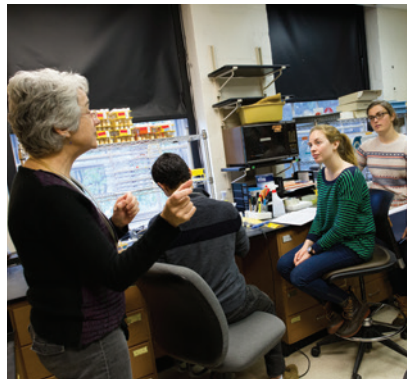

POSTGRADUATION EMPLOYMENT

Graduating seniors enter a variety of career fields, including technology and engineering (27%), research (21%), finance/business (15%), consulting (14%), nonprofit/advocacy (7%), law/politics (7%), education/teaching (7%), and health care (5%). ALUMNI PROFESSIONS

Graduates work in a range of occupations, with the largest categories being educators (24%), scientists and mathematicians (13%), physicians (10%), lawyers or judges (8%), business professionals (8%), and computer scientists (6%).

GRADUATE SCHOOL SUCCESS

During the past five years, 82% of Swarthmore applicants were admitted to medical school, compared with a national average of 42%. Furthermore, 92% of Swarthmore applicants to law school were accepted, compared with a national average of 76%. In a recent national survey, Swarthmore alumni ranked 3rd-highest in the country for earned doctorates across all disciplines, 1st in social sciences, 3rd in life sciences, 4th in humanities, and top 10 in education, math and computer sciences, and physical sciences.
