LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

Singing is the Easy Part

Singing is the easy part. As our boys become young men, they need more than music to help them find their way to responsible adulthood.

That's why, for our 18 basses, rehearsals are about much more than learning music. And why we so appreciate a generous donor's gift to form our Young Men's Club (YMC) two years ago.

Rehearsals are an opportunity for me to talk with the boys about many issues in their lives, from difficulties with their mothers to respectful language.

The "mother" conversation began when a mom brought her son to rehearsal with tears in her eyes and asked me to talk with him. It turned out that they had been arguing over his cell phone. So during a rehearsal break, I mentioned that a few boys were having trouble with their mothers and asked how many were being raised solely by their mothers. Sadly, 15 boys put up their hands. I, too, was raised solely by my mother, so my hand went up as well. I told them that I fought a lot with my mom and that I am ashamed that I took out my frustrations on her. I explained that their

CCC's Sing-to-Learn Reaches 310 Children in Chester Public Schools

In 2009, the chorus embarked on a new venture: bringing a combination of music and academic instruction to Chester chil-

dren in public school classrooms through our Sing-to-Learn Partnership with the Chester-Upland School District.

> Children, teachers, and principals responded so enthusiastically that this year Singto-Learn has expanded from 250 to 310 children and has added second-grade choruses at two of the three participating elementary schools—Main Street and Stetser.

enjoying art, dance, reading, and science; absorbing the chorus culture of respect for all; and building the cohesive community that lays the foundation for a year of

never fully appreciate our mothers. Later in the rehearsal, one ninth-grader casually used the *N* word. That was a rehearsal stopper and led to a thoughtful conversation about when, if ever, that word is appropriate. Most boys agreed that it was never appropriate to use the word.

Young Men's Club funding lets us support boys outside rehearsal, too. I take them to restaurants, where they explore new tastes and practice skills that include conversing graciously to navigating an Indian menu. There's also a twice-weekly workout at a gym. We don't just build bodies; I give them constant positive feedback, and that's helping them learn how to encourage and support each other.

them engaged in second grade," explains CCC assistant music director and Sing-to-Learn teacher Dan Beal.

All second graders participate in the choruses, which rehearse during class time. Their repertoire features songs with educational content, such as lyrics in foreign languages, and with positive messages about character and values, including gospel songs written by director John Alston for the Chester Children's Chorus. Also through the YMC, 14 boys study history twice a week with Mindy Nguyen, an extraordinary teacher. Mindy is so smart and cool that the boys happily gave up two sports periods each week during the summer to study history. Mindy is a full-time, first-grade teacher at CCC's sister organization, the Chester Upland School of the Arts.

Hopefully, with months and years of these kinds of activities, our boys will learn to not be angry with their mothers and to take better care of themselves and each other.

songs that John and Dan write for the younger Sing-to-Learn classes, with lyrics that reinforce the academic curriculum in areas including science and social studies.

Chorus members learn teamwork and performance etiquette as they work toward Dan's goal of singing at senior centers and other settings outside their schools.

This year, Sing-to-Learn is in 12 classrooms in three schools, including Columbus Elementary.

Churches, Board Member Support Additional Concerts

Last year, director John Alston felt the children were singing so beautifully that it was time to take them "on the road"—to bring their polished, joyous music-making to new audiences as a way to spread good news about Chester and find new supporters for the chorus.

This fall, the chorus program includes concerts in four communities where the children have never performed before. In October, the children sang at Church of the Holy Trinity in West Chester, Pa., and at the Prince Theatre in Chestertown, Md. The December Holiday Concert will be presented in Media and Wayne, Pa. (See box on page 1 for Holiday Concert details.)

Holy Trinity and Central Baptist are sponsoring the performances at their churches, and both have pledged continued support for the chorus. They join St. Peter's Church in the Great Valley, Malvern, Pa., which has generously supported the chorus since 2004.

The Chestertown concert was the gift of former CCC board member Leslie Price and her husband, Andy. Their gift included an overnight stay for chorus members at Echo Hill Outdoor School in Chestertown, followed by a day of outdoor adventures on boats, a giant swing, and a zipline.
