LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

Life After the Requiem

ur November performance of Mozart's Requiem was wildly successful. I tell the chorus and audiences that it is the best forty minutes of classical music ever written, and its accessibility and profound expressiveness make it a singular work in the classical canon. This spring we have begun learning Faure's lyrical Cantique de Jean Racine. The Concert Choir members (7th-12th graders) love the music and are equally fascinated and frustrated by the French language, which only four members have studied just a bit. Therefore, I am inserting short French vocabulary lessons in rehearsals that include Racine's poetry as well as more useful and fun words and expressions. It is slow going, but by May they

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will understand every word of the Racine poem, and have developed enough interest in the French language that some may want to study it in college.

The classical showstopper this spring is The Barber of Seville "Overture," which I am arranging for the chorus. We did it seven years ago with a very talented group of baritones, but now the entire Concert Choir has developed enough skill and love for classical music (thank you, Mozart!) that they have internalized classical harmony and gestures. Even with no words (we are using nonsense syllables), the children recognize the emotional qualities in the "Overture" and, more importantly, are willing and able to convey them in their singing. After 19 years, we have grown from singing folk songs not terribly well to performing Mozart and Rossini with skill, commitment, and understanding. One day, our Chester children will achieve genuine bicultural fluency in classical and popular music, and they will be one step closer to achieving the intellectual and social bicultural fluency they will need to improve their city and successfully navigate the wider world.
