Practice Makes...

very day at noon, during Summer Camp, Ray (a 13 year old rising 8th grader) stops by the office to pick up two packs of index cards. The smaller pack is all of the multiplication tables and facts he knows, and the much larger pack is all of them he does not know. Ray has always struggled with school (my wife, Sara, was his 1st grade teacher), and with much encouragement, he 'volunteered' for his summer math intervention. For one hour daily, Ray practices his multiplication facts with one of our older boys. Sometimes it goes well, and he tells me what he has mastered that day. There are many days when he is frustrated. On those days, he practices by himself, and I sporadically encourage him while teaching the altos.


After the camp day, Ray and six older CCC teenagers go with me to Planet Fitness and workout. He has surprising discipline on the treadmill and will out-run me in another year. He proudly bench presses 15-pound dumbbells for 12 reps, and then turns up his short sleeves and flexes in the mirror. (Ray can be generously described as skinny.)

All summer, Ray dutifully practices his math facts and happily builds his fitness. As if on cue, at camp's end, Ray tells me that he knows all of the multiplication tables. We quiz each other and play with the facts. He has indeed memorized them all, though we still need to work on speed.

This fall, Ray is pressing 20-pound dumbbells on the bench, and he is coaching newer members of our workout crew. "Keep the L in the elbows when you press" is one of his pet phrases. And again, as if on cue, during a recent evening bass rehearsal, Ray told the boys and me that he scored a 92% on his last math test.

While practice rarely makes perfect, it does make better, more confident, more caring..... and smart.

Vince Wilson, CCC alumnus 2005: Vince currently lives in Philadelphia, working for an entertainment company named EBE. He writes and



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
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performs his own personal music, gives voice lessons, and produces on the side. Vince provided music production instruction to our campers, as well as serving on the planning committee for the alumni event.


