Lang Social Impact Fellowship Application

The intention of this program is to continue to empower scholars with their partners (faculty, community members, etc) to build impactful solutions (that is, solutions which are sustainable, measurable, innovative, and socially valuable) by providing additional funding and support one to two recent alumni (within 1 to 3 years of graduation) who are ready to scale previously existing projects.

NOTE: Unless otherwise noted, answers should range from 1-2 paragraphs. Since it is not possible to “save and continue” in the online application, please craft all of your answers in a Word doc then cut and paste into the online form once you are ready to submit your application. This google application will be open from March 1 through March 15.

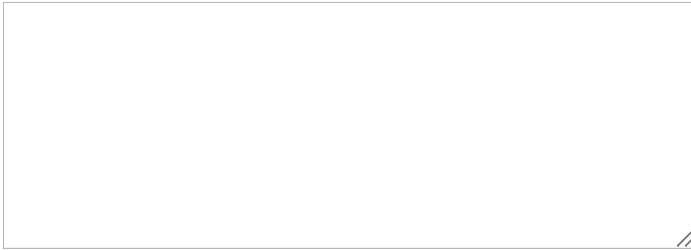

1. Motivation: What motivates you to pursue this fellowship? *

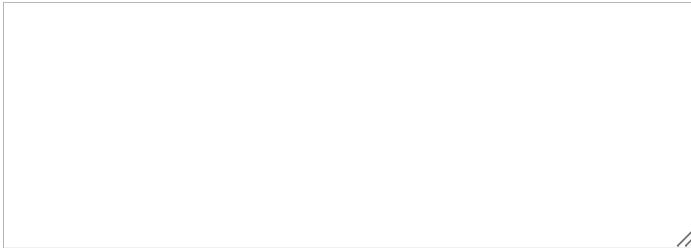

3. Past Experience: Briefly summarize the Lang/Periclean Project you launched as an undergraduate. (5-7 sentences) *

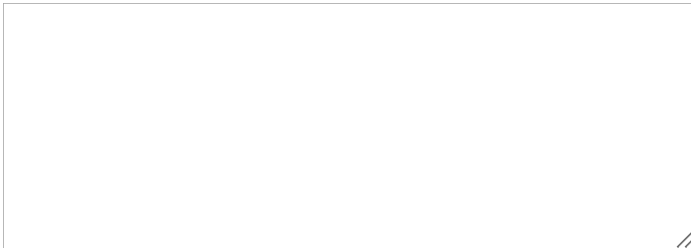
4. Failures: In what ways did you “fail forward” (that is, learn from failure and apply lessons to future work)? *



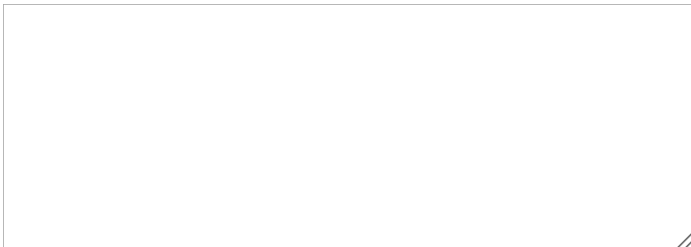

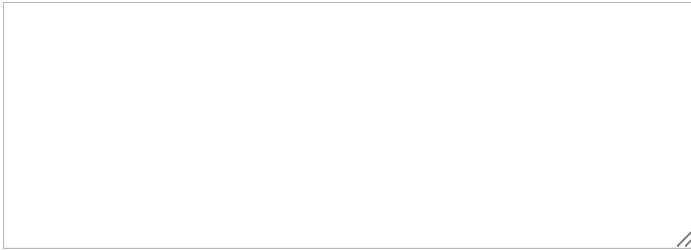

Project Title and Abstract: A successful abstract will tell us what the issue or problem is, and note where it occurs (1 sentence); it tells us about the stakeholders and constituencies who are directly impacted by this issue or problem (1 sentence); it will describe how your project has addressed and will continue to address the problem or issue described above (1 sentence); and it will tell us what your solution is, what change it has created so far, and what changes you anticipate scaling will bring about (1 -2 sentences). (5 sentences total). *



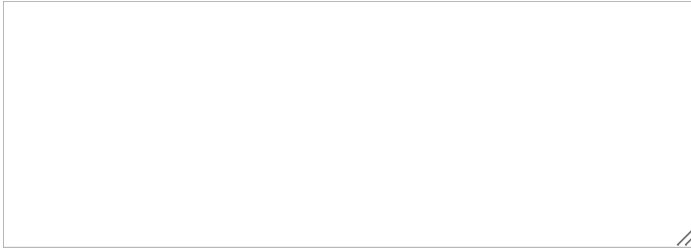

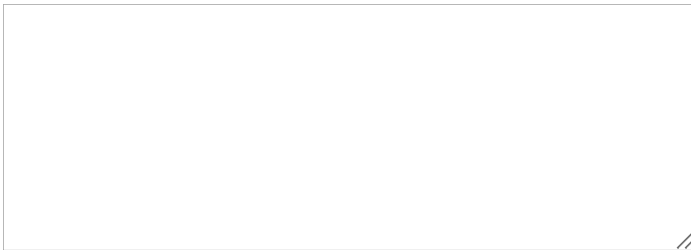
8. Scaling Strategy: Describe where and how you plan to grow, replicate, deepen, broaden, or otherwise “scale up” your project this fellowship year (July 1, 2017 - June 30, 2018). Where and how will you grow the project? Will you add more employees, clients/customers, and/or locations? Will you replicate one model (or a piece of your model) at a specific time as you grow, or will you encourage local customization of your model? Specify the key strategies and activities you plan to undertake in this next phase of your project. A successful answer will describe your anticipated growth and outcomes, as well as a realistic plan for how you will achieve this growth. 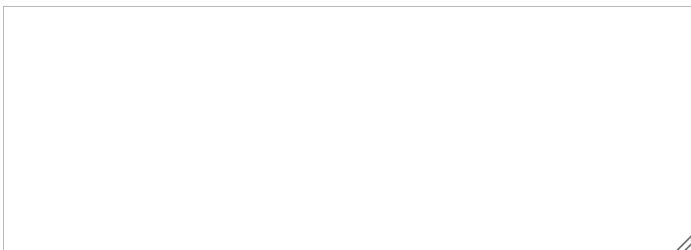

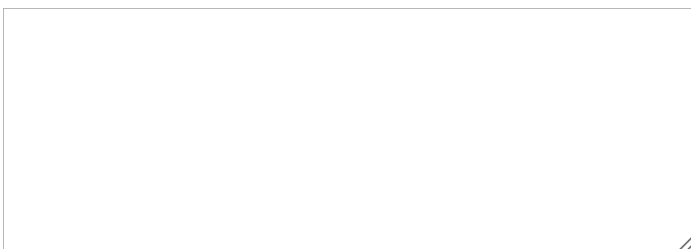
10. Network: Which of your existing connections do you anticipate leveraging as you scale your project? Where are the gaps in your social network? *

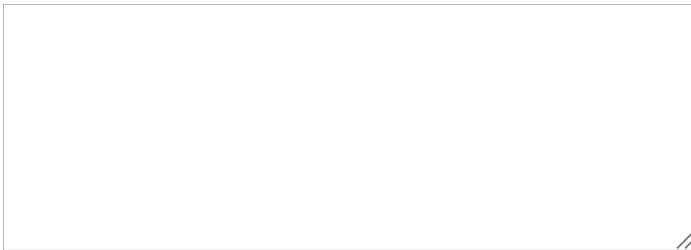

16. References: Please have at least three recommenders submit letters of support. If a letter is written in a language other than English, please append a translation to the letter. At least one of the letters should come from a community partner who you worked with during your Lang/Periclean Project as an undergraduate who can comment upon the social impact of your project. At least one other recommender should be a member of a stakeholder group with whom you will work during the coming year. She/he/they should comment on how you came to work together, how long you have known each other and in what context(s), as well as their individual role within the organization and the nature of your working relationship.
